First, review the discussion framework:

- Be curious and open to listening to all perspectives.
- Be respectful and engaged, encouraging all to participate.
- Be focused and concise, concentrating on the brief and policy, not politics.
- Use the timer to limit comments to two minutes. Pick a person to take notes.

 - Introduce yourself, and share what "lens of care" you wore when reviewing this brief (e.g. personal, professional, community, state, nation, global)?

Let's discuss:

- What was your first impression of The Policy Circle and this idea of roundtable discussions?

- Are you confident in talking about policy topics when they come up? Why do you feel this way?
