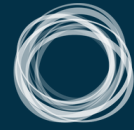

What is human trafficking, why does it matter, and how can communities respond? The **Human Trafficking Brief** answers these questions by examining how trafficking occurs, who is most vulnerable to exploitation, and the policies and partnerships working to prevent it.



When you hear the term “human trafficking,” what comes to mind? Where do you think those impressions come from (media, education, personal experience, etc.)?

What assumptions might prevent us from recognizing human trafficking in our own communities? What might it look like locally?

What are vulnerabilities (social, economic, etc.) that traffickers look for when targeting potential victims?

If trafficking is widely underreported, how does that shape public understanding and policymaking?

What roles should local, state, and federal governments each play in preventing trafficking and supporting survivors? Where should responsibilities overlap or not?

If you were advising a state legislator, what action would you encourage them to take? What trade-offs might policymakers face when designing anti-trafficking laws?

What businesses or organizations in our area are uniquely positioned to interrupt trafficking if properly trained?

What survivor services exist in our state or community? Where might gaps still remain?

How do evolving cultural norms play a role in the growth of trafficking victims and demand for coerced labor?

## FROM DISCUSSION TO ACTION: WAYS TO GET MORE ENGAGED

### Learn What's Happening in Your State

- Review your state's human trafficking laws. How do they compare to neighboring states?
- Identify any pending legislation related to trafficking, online safety, labor protections, or survivor services.
- Invite a local policymaker, prosecutor, or non-profit advocate to speak at a future Circle meeting.

### Map Local Resources and Gaps

- Research local organizations serving trafficking survivors (shelters, legal aid, counseling services, job training).
- Identify whether your community has a human trafficking task force.
- Discuss: Where might gaps exist – housing? mental health services? prevention education?

### Partner with Local Organizations

- Volunteer as a Circle to help a local organization.
- Support workforce reintegration programs that provide job pathways for survivors.
- Offer professional skills (legal, financial literacy, marketing, mentoring).
